### ASTHO Launches E-Cigarette Resource Library ASTHO

ASTHO has created the E-Cigarette Resource Library, a searchable database of information on e-cigarettes for state public health leaders to use when seeking resources on the topic. The library houses a collection of articles, media stories, factsheets, and other materials related to e-cigarettes. States and partners can search for e-cigarette information by category and resource type. ASTHO will continue to add to the library and welcomes individuals to submit resources for addition to the database.

## FDA Issues Warning Letters for Selling Flavored Cigarettes FDA

Four tobacco manufacturers received warning from FDA for selling flavored cigarettes that are labeled as little cigars or cigars, a violation of the Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act. The products in violation include the Swisher Sweets, Cheyenne, Prime Time, and Criss-Cross brands. Manufacturers have 15 working days to respond after receiving the warning letters. FDA expects many of the products to remain on the market while it works with manufacturers to achieve compliance with the law. Individuals can report potential tobacco-related violations by using FDA's reporting form.

# FDA Releases Revised Guidance on Registration and Product Listing

FDA

FDA issued the guidance document, "Registration and Product Listing for Owners and Operators of Domestic Tobacco Product Establishments." This document is a revision of guidance issued in July 2016. The guidance clarifies that for U.S. manufacturers of newly regulated tobacco products who manufactured those products prior to Aug. 8., FDA does not intend to enforce the submission deadline for registration and product listing provided that FDA receives applications on or before June 30, 2017. Companies that manufacture products after Aug. 8 must register and list their products immediately with FDA.

Funding is available to public or private, non-profit, and higher education institutions in the United States, accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting promote youth smoking. The report culminates in a call to action for the gaming industry, parents and adults, public health advocates and researchers, and policymakers to take steps to reduce the risk of influencing youth tobacco use through video games.

### CDC Releases National Youth Tobacco Survey Data

CDC's Office on Smoking and Health and FDA's Center for Tobacco Products released National Youth Tobacco Survey datasets as well as the availability of the accompanying questionnaire, methodology report, and codebook. The datasets are available for public use and are designed for states to compare their estimates of prevalence of youth tobacco use with national data. Additionally, this survey provides national data on long-term, intermediate, and short-term indicators, which are key to the design, implementation, and evaluation of comprehensive tobacco prevention and control programs.

### Tobacco 21 Included in Solutions to Help Cities Thrive

de Beaumont Foundation

The de Beaumont Foundation's CityHealth project announced a new package of nine proven policies designed to impact the health of residents of America's cities. CityHealth's new package represents a proactive agenda of actions leaders can take to make their cities the best places to live, work, and do business. Each of the proposed solutions is supported by evidence, falls under city jurisdiction, must be addressed through policy change, and has a track record of bipartisan support. Tobacco 21 is included as one of the policies in the package. Release of the policy package is the first of several steps designed to spark a national conversation about using policy to create healthier lives and strengthen communities.

The Virginia Foundation for Healthy Youth developed "The Dangers of Other Tobacco Products" module to provide prevention education to youth in middle and high school. The module can be used as a stand-alone presentation or it can be added to an existing educational curriculum to augment information about tobacco use prevention in a classroom setting. Pre- and post-test surveys were conducted with hundreds of youth in Virginia, which showed significant increases in knowledge related to students' understanding of the addictive qualities and dangers of other tobacco products.

Registration Open for Community Health Promotion Summit in Kansas (KS) — Wichita State University. The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Health Promotion will hold its annual Community Health Promotion Summit on Jan. 25-27, 2017, in Manhattan, KS. The summit theme is addressing health equity to prevent tobacco use and chronic disease with pre-summit workshops on wasted food and reducing youth access to tobacco products. A limited number of <a href="scholarships">scholarships</a> for travel expenses are available to organizations and communities applying for Chronic Disease Risk Reduction funds for the first time.

### In the News

First "Less Harmful" Market Alternative Cigarette Filed for U.S.

Approval — Reuters. Philip Morris International, Inc. filed a muchawaited U.S. application to market a new type of cigarette, which the company claims has less than 10 percent of the harmful chemicals found in cigarette smoke. The device electronically heats tobacco to produce a vapor without burning, making the product "less harmful" according to Philip Morris. If approved, it would give the company's alternative cigarette, the iQOS device, a significant marketing advantage over alternatives to tobacco products, including electronic cigarettes, which are not allowed to make such a claim.

### Even One Cigarette a Day Will Not Keep Early Death Away —

Reuters. A new study conducted by the National Cancer Institute reinforces that there is no safe level of cigarette smoking. Smokers in the study who consistently smoked less than one cigarette per day were more likely to die than never smokers. Researchers encourage physicians to intervene with patients who report any level of current tobacco use. As a motivating message, the sooner individuals quit smoking, the greater the health benefits in extending life.

### Research

State Medicaid Expansion Tobacco Cessation Coverage and Number of Adult Smokers Enrolled in Expansion Coverage — United States, 2016 – MMWR. Key Findings: This article provides an update on states' coverage of tobacco cessation treatments under the expansion of Medicaid, which serves a population that smokes at a much higher rate (27.8%) than adults with private insurance (11.1%). As of July 1, all 32 states with Medicaid expansion cover some form of tobacco cessation treatments, with nine states covering all nine approved treatments as part of Medicaid. Study authors write that states with expanded Medicaid can encourage use of tobacco cessation treatments by covering more treatments or by reducing barriers to coverage, such as copayments and prior authorization.

Consumption of Combustible and Smokeless Tobacco — United States, 2000–2015 – MMWR. Key Findings: Researchers analyzed federal tax data from 2000 to 2015 to determine the total consumption of combustible and smokeless tobacco products in the United States. During this time, per capita consumption of all combustible products decreased by 43.7 percent, while per capita consumption of smokeless products increased by 4.2 percent. Study authors highlight the importance of comprehensive tobacco prevention strategies that acknowledge the diversity of tobacco products consumed in the United States.

Public Understanding of Cigarette Smoke Constituents: Three US Surveys – Tobacco Control. Key Findings: Researchers conducted phone surveys of adolescents and adults and an online survey of adults to measure perceptions of harm in cigarette smoke constituents. Across these surveys, between 43 and 72 percent of respondents incorrectly reported that harmful chemicals in cigarette smoke are primarily additives and are not inherent in tobacco. Ammonia, arsenic, formaldehyde, hydrogen cyanide, lead, and uranium were the constituents most likely to deter survey respondents from smoking. These findings could inform media campaigns that aim to discourage cigarette smoking.

Misperceptions of Harm among Natural American Spirit Smokers:

Results from Wave 1 of the Population Assessment of Tobacco and Health (PATH) Study (2013–2014) – Tobacco Control. Key

Findings: An analysis of data from the first wave of the PATH study, a nationally representative study of American adults, indicated that 2.3 percent of American smokers smoke Natural American Spirit (NAS) as their usual brand. Researchers found that almost 64

percent of NAS smokers believe their brand is less harmful than other cigarettes compared to 8.3 percent of smokers of other brands. Researchers call for corrective messaging and enforcement against NAS's use of "natural," "organic," and "additive-free" as marketing terms to address inaccurate perceptions of harm reduction.

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
