# **Circulating Help Your Peers** Requests

## Combining YRBS and YTS Questionnaires Deadline: May 24

For the first time in many years, both Nebraska's YRBS and YTS projects fell below the minimum threshold of a 60% combined response rate, thus limiting the usefulness of the

opportunity announcement (FOA) to support observational or intervention research focused on reducing health disparities in tobacco use in the United States. The FOA is intended to stimulate scientific inquiry focused on innovative tobacco control policies.

## Vape Detectors in Schools

#### Deadline: May 28

South Dakota is hearing from local communities, schools, and coalitions that they would like to purchase "vape detectors" to put in school bathrooms to help address the vaping epidemic. They are curious if other states have had similar requests, and if anyone has actually worked with localities to purchase/install the vape detectors.

## **Partner Announcements**

- FDA <u>announced</u> that Philip Morris is allowed to sell its IQOS tobacco heating system products in the United States after approving its pre-market tobacco product application. Philip Morris' modified risk tobacco product application for its IQOS products is still pending.
- CDC's Office on Smoking and Health <u>developed</u>an informational presentation and supplemental materials to help adults educate youth aged 11-18 on the health risks of e-cigarette use.
- A coalition of eight national public health groupswrote a letter to The Walt Disney Company encouraging them to require that Vice Media, an organization Disney partly owns, end its business relationship with Philip Morris International.

## **State News**

 Tobacco 21 legislation <u>passed</u> both houses of the Vermont legislature and is expected to be signed by Gov. Phil Scott.

- Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis <u>signed</u> a bill that will prohibit e-cigarette use in enclosed indoor workplaces, with some exceptions. The Florida Legislature won't <u>pass</u> a tobacco 21 bill after the Senate approved the measure.
- The Colorado Senate voted down a bill backed by Gov. Jared Polis that would have tripled tobacco taxes to \$2.59 per pack and establish a 62 percent tax on other tobacco products, including ecigarettes.

## In the News

- Walgreens <u>announced</u> that they will no longer sell tobacco products to consumers under age 21.
  Walmart then <u>announced</u> a similar policy that also includes no longer carrying sweet-flavored ecigarette products.
- JUUL Labs lobbying efforts at the state level are <u>advocating</u> for policy positions contrary to the company's stated priority of keeping their products away from underage consumers, such as the opposition of flavored tobacco product bans.
- Public health advocates are <u>concerned</u> that federal tobacco 21 legislation announced by Sen. Mitch McConnell might contain provisions favored by the tobacco industry.
- A Philip Morris International subsidy will <u>begin</u> selling life insurance in the UK, with plans to expand to other countries, and will offer premium discounts to cigarette smokers who quit or switch to other tobacco products.
- JUUL Labs <u>plans</u> to design a mobile app that aims to assist combustible tobacco users switch to JUUL products.

## Research

- A JAMA Internal Medicine analysis of nationally representative data <u>concluded</u> that social disadvantages such as unemployment, low income, and lacking a high school diploma are highly related to smoking prevalence, with more disadvantages leading to higher smoking rates.
- CDC research published in *Tobacco Control* <u>found</u>that 7.9 percent of adults have ever used e-cigarettes shaped like USB devices, including 45.9 percent of all adults that report using any e-cigarette products.
- A Nicotine & Tobacco Research analysis of national data <u>concluded</u> that cigar use is significantly more prevalent among non-Hispanic black individuals than other racial/ethnic groups, and that cigar use increased between 2002 and 2016 in non-Hispanic black women.

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
