- ASTHO <u>published</u> a blog post highlighting TCN's role in state and territorial tobacco control successes over the last 25 years, featuring remarks from ASTHO Chief Medical Officer Marcus Plescia and TCN Chair Luci Longoria.
- Truth Initiative <u>updated</u> their Tobacco Nation report on geographic disparities in tobacco use and published a corresponding <u>GIS story map</u> that allows users to explore a host of relevant data at the state and county level.
- ALA published several new resources, including an overview of tobacco cessation <u>quality measures</u>, a report on tobacco cessation coverage in <u>non-compliant health plans</u>, and a one-pager on <u>1332</u> <u>Waivers</u> and tobacco cessation coverage.
- Nuestras Voces and NAATPN <u>collaborated</u> on an infographic that describes how asthma, a condition commonly triggered by tobacco use, disproportionately impacts different racial and ethnic minority groups in the United States.
- Emory Centers for Training and Technical Assistance <u>updated</u> their archive of tobacco control surveillance and evaluation webinars with slides and recordings on topics including GIS mapping and tobacco 21 policy evaluation.
- There are multiple announcements from the FDA Center for Tobacco Products:
 - FDA <u>announced</u> that they joined FTC in issuing warning letters to four e-cigarette liquid manufacturers for failing to include required nicotine warning statements as part of social media posts.
 - FDA <u>published</u> a guidance on premarket tobacco product applications for ecigarette products.
 - FDA <u>released</u> a free digital calendar to assist retailers in their compliance to

State News

- Illinois <u>passed</u> a \$1 per pack cigarette tax and a 15% e-cigarette tax as part of a larger infrastructure plan that raises taxes and fees in the state.
- **Texas** <u>became</u> the 15th state to pass a tobacco 21 policy when Gov. Greg Abbott signed a policy that exempts members of the military.
- Beverly Hills, California passed a bill that outlaws the sale of most tobacco products within the town, exempting cigar lounges and hotels, in a policy believed to be the first of its kind in the United States.

In the News

- Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz

 (FL) <u>introduced</u> the Protect Act, which would provide \$500 million to CDC over five years to address the youth e-cigarette epidemic. Sens. Mitt Romney (UT) and Tom Udall (NM) <u>proposed</u> the Smoke-Free Schools Act of 2019, which would restrict the use of e-cigarette products in schools and childcare facilities nationwide.
- The House Oversight Subcommittee on Economic and Consumer Policy <u>sent</u> a letter to JUUL Labs CEO Kevin Burns requesting documents related to

the company's marketing and social media practices.

- FDA <u>submitted</u> a proposal outlining a 10-month deadline for e-cigarette product review applications after a federal judge ruled the agency was acting improperly in pushing this deadline back to 2022.
- An article in *Time Magazine overviews* how tobacco companies are using federal and state tobacco 21 bills as opportunities to advance their own interests.
- The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs <u>announced</u>that starting in October it will prohibit the use of tobacco products across all of its healthcare facilities.

Research

- An MMWR analysis of BRFSS data from 2017 <u>concluded</u> that 6.2% of Americans have been diagnosed by chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, including 15.2% of current cigarette smokers, 7.6% of former smokers, and 2.8% of never smokers.
- An analysis of online survey data published in *Drug* and Alcohol Dependence found an association between e-liquid package images with cartoons and increased susceptibility to use e-cigarettes, a finding consistent with prior research on combustible cigarettes.
- A Preventing Chronic Disease analysis of national survey data <u>concluded</u> that when controlling for sociodemographic characteristics such as age, sex, and race/ethnicity, lower educational attainment and poverty status remain powerful risk factors for cigarette smoking in the United States.

- A Nicotine & Tobacco Research analysis of national survey data found that 41% of current tobacco product users used a flavored product between 2014-2015, and that flavored product use was positively associated with increased odds of daily tobacco product use and using tobacco within 30 minutes of waking up.
- According to an analysis of data from BRFSS and other sources in *Preventing Chronic Disease*, 63.3% of the variability in county-level cigarette smoking prevalence can be <u>attributed</u> to the proportion of non-Hispanic white adults, lower educational attainment, and high violent crime rates.

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
